## From Fifty-One to Ten Million

Sunday, November 18, 2012 at the Compact Day Dinner, Annapolis, MD

Our featured guest speaker for the Compact Day Dinner will be Bruce Campbell MacGunnigle. He is our 32nd Governor General of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. Governor General MacGunnigle has been a member for 40 years, joining the Rhode Island Society at the young age of 24, the first in his family to do so.

Governor General MacGunnigle is a descendant of William Brewster, James Chilton, Francis Cooke, Edward Fuller, Stephen Hopkins, Thomas Rogers, and Richard Warren; and has twelve lines of descent to seven of the twenty-three families on the *Mayflower*. He was elected Governor of the Rhode Island Mayflower Society at the age of 39, becoming the youngest governor in that Society's history.

He has been elected as member-at-large of the Executive Committee, Captain General, Assistant Governor General, and now Governor General, holding more General Society offices than any other member in our 115-year history.

Governor MacGunnigle served as Congress Planning Chairman at four General Congresses, and is the author of the five-generation family genealogy book, *Mayflower Families, Volume 4 – Edward Fuller*. He has also authored a Regimental

book for the First Rhode Island Regiment for 1781, a detailed study of the men in the regiment. He is a retired jewelry findings manufacturing executive, and works part-time with 200 small businesses in East Greenwich, RI, his hometown. Among other things, he has organized award-winning street festivals on Main Street.



Governor General MacGunnigle, our 32nd Governor General of the General Society, will be our guest speaker.

Governor MacGunnigle is also the Governor of the Rhode Island Society of Colonial Wars, a past president of both the Rhode Island Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (RISSAR) and the National Huguenot societies, as well as a member of the Rhode Island Founders and Patriots. Bruce and Kate, his wife of 39 years, are the parents of Douglas and Alison, both members of the Rhode Island Society. You won't want to miss Governor General MacGunnigle's presentation.

## NEW VIDEO: "Chilton's Challenge"

At last year's Compact Day Dinner, we were treated to the premiere performance of the play entitled, "Chilton's Challenge: a father and daughter's story of their pilgrimage to Plimouth Plantation." The play was written by our own Jim Battles who played the role of his ancestor, James Chilton. The daughter, Mary Chilton, was played by Susan Battles Brown (Jim's first cousin once removed).

As part of the Society's' education program, it was decided that a video would be made to distribute to schools across the State. The Society wanted to reproduce the play in a historic house to keep the scenes more realistic. Thankfully, Gini Patterson volunteered her museum house, "Partnership." The Partnership dates back to 1720 and was the perfect location for reshooting the play.

On a warm Summer day in August, Jim and his cousin, Susan, put on their costumes and gathered at the Partnership to perform the play for the cameras. The videographer and producer, Loraine Gagalis-Berdeguez, was able to turn this 18th-century house into a studio for the shoot. Governor Ben Proctor recorded the introduction at the TV studios in Annapolis. Loraine is in the process of editing the footage and doing her magic to produce the video, which will be available on DVD. We are hoping to have a preview version of the completed video for the Compact Day Dinner—keep your fingers crossed!

## FIRST NUTRITION BAR

Aside from using cranberries for food, medicine, and dyes, the native Indians used cranberries to promote peace. The great Sachem (Algonquian chief) held feasts in which cranberries were served. Cranberries were associated with peace and their appearance on the table during feasts became a symbol of peace.

The Native Americans also invented the first known transportable nutrition-packed food bar. This was called "pemmican" and was made of dried meat for protein and dried berries, mostly cranberries, for vitamins (and a little zing), and melted fat, which congealed and provided energy. Many varieties of fruit were used in pemmican, depending upon the local availability of fruit, the cranberry being the choice among the New England Native Americans.

Cranberries are a traditional food of the Wampanoag Indians in Plymouth. They referred to the ruby red berry as “ibimi” or bitter fruit. The Pilgrims renamed this fruit “crane berries” because the long vines and pink blossoms resembled the shape of the bird, the crane. In the old days, cranberries were not cultivated but grew in wild bogs. The Wampanoag people utilized the berry for food, medicine, and at least by the 19th century, as dye.

Each year, in the beginning of October, the Aquinnah Wampanoag (on the island of Martha’s Vineyard) celebrate “Cranberry Day,” an official Tribal holiday, honoring the ripening of the last wild berry. Families go down to the bogs to spend the day picking, just as they did decades ago in oxcarts and as their ancestors did centuries ago. Wampanoag children have the day off from school. The day is completed with a cookout lunch and potluck social, with dancing and singing, in the evening, celebrating with neighbors, friends, and family.

In the old days, the Wampanoags would dry the cranberries and store them in earthen pits buried deep enough to prevent freezing. They would draw on the berries in the winter as a rich source of vitamins when other plant food became scarce. Fishermen who went out to sea for a long time would take cranberries with them, knowing that the cranberries (a source of Vitamin C) would prevent sickness.

## CRANBERRY DAY:

a large part of the Wampanoag culture



**The Wampanoag Indians celebrated many “thanksgivings” that coincided with the changes of seasons and harvest times. However, Cranberry Day was an important holiday because it gave them an opportunity to give thanks to the Creator for a fruit that helped their people survive. They later traded cranberries for goods not found, like sugar and molasses.**

### Wampanoag Cranberry Sauce\*

2 cup cranberries  
1 cup water  
1 cup sugar

Wash the cranberries. Place the berries and water in a saucepan. Cook until soft. Add sugar. Cook 3-5 minutes more, or until berries are boiling.

\*NOTE: The Pilgrims did not eat cranberry sauce on the first Thanksgiving since sugar was in short supply, but they probably ate them raw. Historical evidence does not make any reference to cranberry sauce until 1663.

## 2012 General Society

### Board of Assistants Meeting

On Saturday, September 8, 2012, the General Board of Assistants met at the Wyndham Hotel in Mt. Laurel, New Jersey. Thirty-eight states plus Canada and the District of Columbia were represented by approximately 160 registered delegates and guests. Susan Morrison, Assistant General and Benjamin Proctor, Jr., Deputy Governor General, represented the state of Maryland. Highlights of the meeting include:

- An interim Executive Director, Thomas Colligan, has been hired. His primary functions are to supervise day-to-day operations, establish a fundraising program, and support the General Board of Assistants and the Executive Committee. This new position will allow leadership continuity since new officers are elected every three years.
- The Mayflower House is undergoing a year-long environmental study to determine the future

needs of an HVAC system. This is necessary in order to preserve its collection that has shown signs of deterioration.

- A proposal to the Bylaws was made to add the Surgeon, Elder, and Captain General as voting members of the Executive Committee. This proposal was favorably received and will be voted on at Congress in 2014.
- The banquet speaker was Richard Pickering of Plimouth Plantation.

The New Jersey Society were gracious hosts and were well-organized with several interesting side trips to Atlantic City, Lambertville, the Battleship New Jersey, and the Old Barracks Museum in Trenton and others. The 2013 Board of Assistants meeting will be held next September in New Orleans. No hurricanes, please!



## 2012 Scholarship Winner

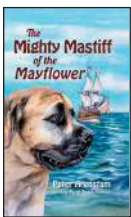
### Maryland Society's first recipient
